THE STORY OF EVERY SORT OF PEOPLE

In 2016, Culture Shift, in partnership with Lewes Football Club, had an idea for an accessible community festival. The idea came out of Culture Shift's work in learning disability arts and accessible programming, which resonated with Lewes FC's role as a community football club.

Rather than producing an arts and music festival for people with learning disabilities, the organisers' ambition was to deliver something accessible and enjoyable for everyone: a truly accessible community event aimed at people of all backgrounds, abilities and ages.

To reflect this ambition, the event was called **Every Sort of People**.

Culture Shift raised funds from Big Lottery and Sussex Community Foundation and developed an active partnership of Lewes-based community organisations to steer and deliver the event.



EVALUATION FINDINGS

The vast majority of audience members and organisers rated the event as either 'good' or 'excellent' across a range of quality metrics.

CONCLUSION

The success of this event proves that integrated community programming is possible, and that accessibility benefits everyone.

Specific accommodations included accessible toilets, free tickets for carers, a Migloo accessible changing suite, Blue Badge parking, accessible bars and food, and the organisers' ambition is to make the next festival even more accessible.

The partnership behind **Every Sort of People** hopes that this will become an annual event, and will inspire more accessible community programming in the future.

Future viability is dependent on achieving sponsorship from local businesses, as well as increasing ticket sales.
